


Kenilworth's Engineering Age

Nothing was Wasted




Rails to Kenilworth and Milverton


The Inns and Roads of Kenilworth

Tea at the Castle




A House in the High Street

Joyce Powell's recollections and memories of growing up and life with her family in one of the best known houses in High Street, Kenilworth.






Kenilworth at School

The well researched story of the development of schools in Kenilworth and also the charities, some of which still exist. Covers the period 1700 to 1914.




Still Looking Back

The continuing story of a Kenilworth family between 1937 and 1987 by Eileen Tisdale. The follow on to 'Looking Back' which is now out of print.




Looking Back Again

Eileen Tisdale continues her look back at people, places and pastimes over the last 100 years. Third book in her series.




